Alpha Rho Chi fraternity was founded at the Universities of Illinois and Michigan on April 11, 1914. It is a social undergraduate fraternity limiting its membership to students of architecture, architectural engineering, landscape architecture, or the allied arts, enrolled in the departments leading to a bachelor's degree. The name Alpha Rho Chi is derived from the first five letters in Architecture. The title of the magazine is derived from the same source.

Arcus of Illinois and Sigma Upsilon of Michigan Nationalize April 11, 1914 to Form the Architectural Fraternity, Alpha Rho Chi

(Reprint April 1930 ARCHI)

ARCUS SOCIETY

TO GIVE YOU an accurate account of our Fraternity history in the early days, it is appropriate that a few words be written of the two local societies that joined in 1914 to form Alpha Rho Chi. These two locals were Sigma Upsilon at the University of Michigan, and Arcus at the University of Illinois.

SIGMA UPSILON

The Sigma Upsilon fraternity was started in the first semester of 1910-1911, by eight men, consisting of one senior, three juniors, two sophomores, and two freshmen. At this time another architectural fraternity asked for recognition, but it was absorbed by Sigma Upsilon. This body was then granted recognition, and Sigma Upsilon became an official campus organization.

The original intention of Sigma Upsilon was to be the Alpha chapter of a national professional fraternity, and the constitution and by-laws were drafted with that in view.

From the original minute book we have gleaned the following facts: Titles of Sigma Upsilon officers in 1911 were Worthy Master, Worthy Scribe, Worthy Chaplain, Worthy Sentinel, and Worthy Usher. Their pledge pin was a pyramid on a circle. The white rose was adopted as the official Sigma Upsilon flower in June 1912. In the autumn of 1912 a house was maintained at 417 E. University, Ann Arbor, Mich. The chapter was granted official recognition by the Michigan Committee on Non-Athletic Affairs in October 1912. Correspondence was had with Auburn and Minnesota regarding the establishment of new chapters at those schools in 1913. Professor Lorch brought the name of Sigma Upsilon before the educational committee of the American Institute of Architects in December 1913. Correspondence with Arcus was started in February 1914.

Arcus Society was formed in the autumn of 1911 by a group of about fifteen men, and existed secretly until the fall of 1912, when formal approval for the founding of the society was secured from the Council of Administration. Early in 1913 the group was recognized by the faculty. During the time of organization, meetings were held in the Y.M.C.A. at the University. The society secured a house the first semester of 1913-1914. Arcus Society limited its membership to sophomores, juniors, and seniors.

Brother W. M. Wadsworth, of the Arcus Society, was delegated to write to various universities throughout the country and inquire about other architectural societies wishing to combine to form a national fraternity. Letters were sent to Harvard, Washington University, Georgia School of Technology, Cornell University, University of Pennsylvania, University of California, and the University of Michigan. The result was the beginning of correspondence between Brother C. C. Cohagen, of Sigma Upsilon at Michigan, and Brother Leo M. Bauer, of Arcus at Illinois.

Faculty members of Arcus were Dr. N. C. Ricker, L. H. Provine, and A. H. Kimball.

In February 1914 correspondence with L'Ogive and Gargoyle at Cornell for a time showed considerable promise, and Cleveland, Ohio, was selected originally as a meeting place for the first conference, when it was expected that three local societies (Michigan, Illinois, and Cornell) would form the nucleus for the first architectural fraternity. Gargoyle of Cornell reported in late March that they would be unable to send a delegate to the conference, and the meeting place was changed to Chicago.

APRIL ELEVENTH

The conference was called for April 10-14, 1914, at the Hotel Sherman, Chicago. Mr. Chandler C. Cohagen, of Sigma Upsilon,

and Mr. Leo M. Bauer, of Arcus Society, were the delegates to this meeting. A name for the new fraternity was first discussed. Names of secular nature were presented by the delegates, and only one of Greek origin was offered by the Illinois delegate, that being the name, "Alpha Rho Chi," an admirable selection by Dr. Nathan Clifford Ricker, of the faculty of the University of Illinois.

DIVISION OF DUTIES

The constitution, by-laws, emblems, and other insignia of both societies were totally disregarded, and only those retained that might be sufficiently suitable and pleasing for the new fraternity. The Arcus Society was allowed to draft the national constitution and by-laws, and the Sigma Upsilon Society the local chapter constitution and by-laws; the Arcus Society the official badge, and the Sigma Upsilon Society the coat-of-arms. It proved later, however, that the Arcus Society revised the Sigma Upsilon design for the coat-of-arms, which was adopted afterward by the first Grand Council in session at Ann Arbor, Mich., in mid-November 1914. The colors, maroon and navy blue, formerly of the Arcus Society, were retained by the new fraternity (Sigma Upsilon colors being blue and gold). The motto, "Fidelitas, Amor et Artes," resulted from a combination of the mottoes of the two societies. The Arcus Society was directed to draft the charter forms, and Sigma Upsilon the certificate of membership. The Sigma Upsilon flower, the white rose, was adopted as the fraternity flower.

FIRST GRAND COUNCIL

The delegates to the Chicago Conference empowered the societies which they represented to choose the officers of the Grand Council for the first ensuing year. Arcus Society was given the elective power of the Worthy Grand Architect, L. M. Bauer was W.G.A. selected, and Professor A. H. Kimball was chosen as first Grand Lecturer.

The Sigma Upsilon Society was given the elective power of Worthy Grand Scribe, C. C. Cohagen being selected, and of Worthy Grand Estimator, for which G. M. McConkey was named. The Sigma Upsilon Society is given credit for the drafting of the formal ritual, C. C. Cohagen, who was chairman of that committee, being the author. The chapter names were selected by the two organized chapters from a list of names of prominent master architects, the list having been prepared by faculty representatives at each institution. The Illinois chapter chose the name Anthemios, and the Michigan chapter Iktinos. It was the original intent to use the Greek spelling of all architects' names selected for future chapters. Both Anthemios and Iktinos chapters were incorporated according to their respective state laws. The original National Articles of Association were lost in the mails, and new articles were issued. L. M. Bauer, C. C. Cohagen, A. H. Kimball, G. W. McConkey, A. E. Benson, and C. W. Ditchey were the signed incorporators on the latter document.

INSTALLATION

The Anthemios chapter was formally installed May 22, 1914, and the Iktinos chapter June 5, 1914. The original intent was to announce and install the two chapters simultaneously, but emergency conditions at Illinois made it necessary to make public announcement and incorporate a week before originally planned.

L. M. Bauer was president of Arcus, and H. J. Trum was president of Sigma Upsilon at the time of nationalization. Clair W. Ditchey, of Iktinos, followed Brother Trum, and Arthur E. Benson ruled Anthemios after Brother Bauer had completed his term of office.

To Brothers Bauer and Cohagen the fraternity awards the title

of "Founders," a small reward, we believe, to these two men who gave so freely of their time and energy in the early days of the Alpha Rho Chi Fraternity.

To Dr. Ricker and Professor A. H. Kimball of Illinois, we are indebted for many things concerning the organization and development of Alpha Rho Chi. To Professor Herbert R. Cross we are indebted for our official fraternity song. We are indebted to D. H. Williams, C. C. Cohagen, and G. M. McConkey for much of our ritual, and to Brother Bauer for the designs of the pin and arms.

Grand Council Officers

At the Chicago meeting April, 1914, the Anthemios chapter was given the power to select the Worthy Grand Architect, and to the Iktinos chapter was given the selection of the Worthy Grand Scribe and the Worthy Grand Estimator. At the first convention the Grand Council officers selected by these two chapters were unanimously retained, the officers drawing for the length of term that each should serve. Bauer, W. G. A., drew 2 years; Cohagen, W. G. S., drew 1 year; and McConkey, W. G. E., drew 3 years.

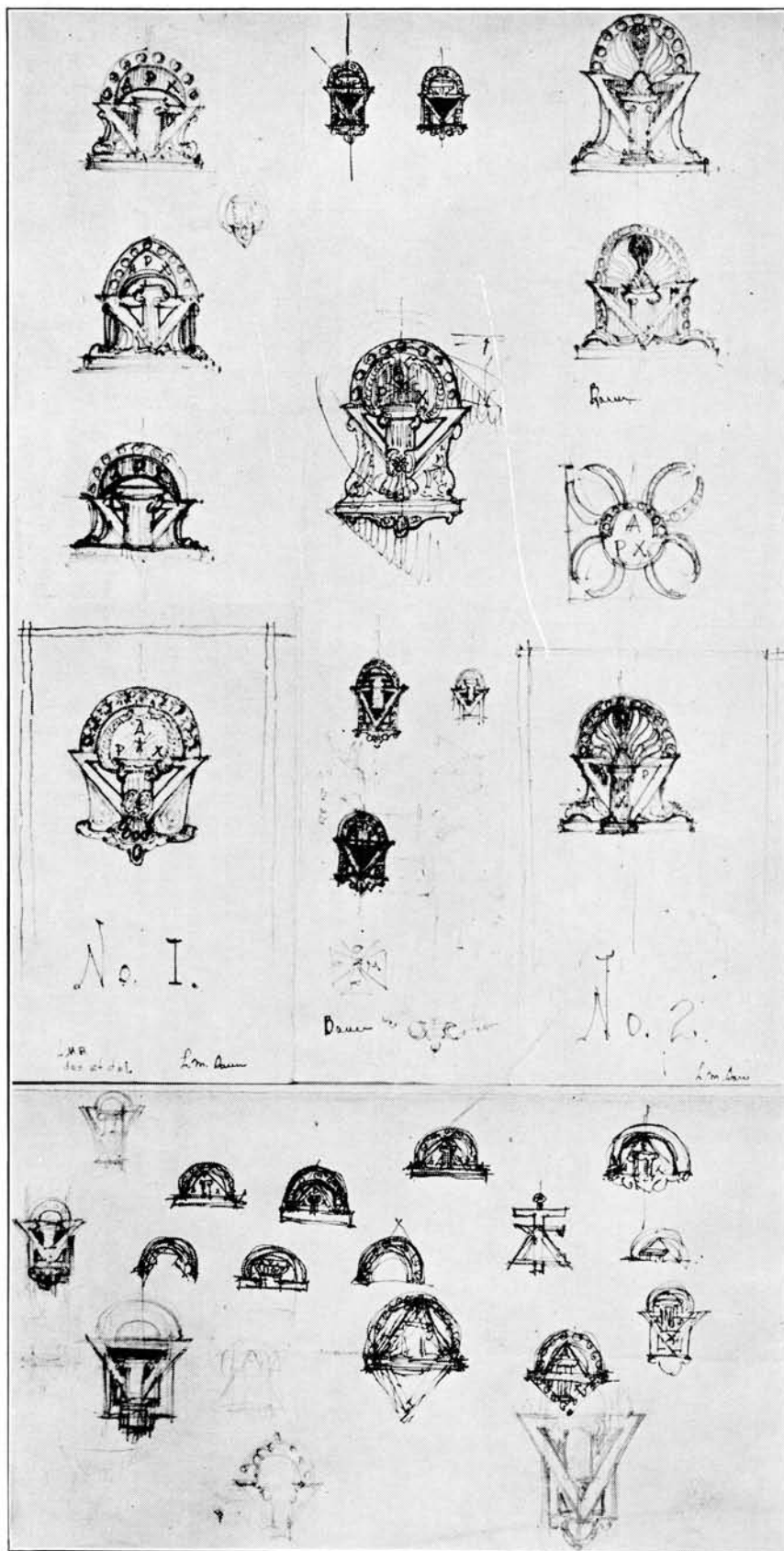

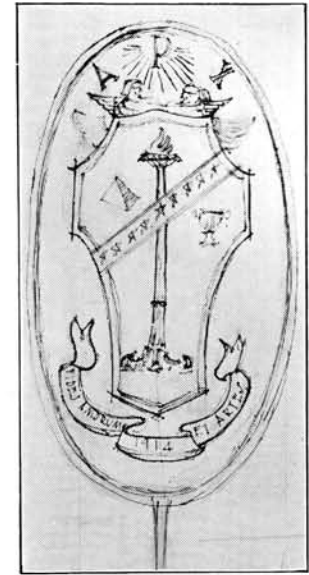
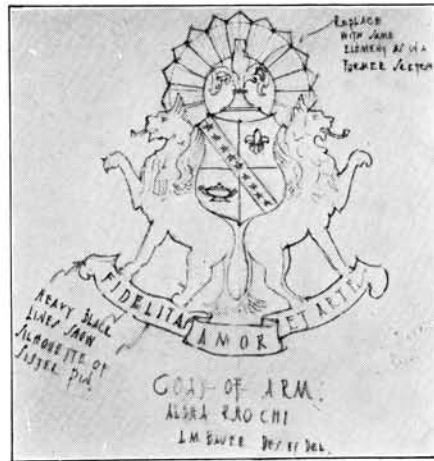
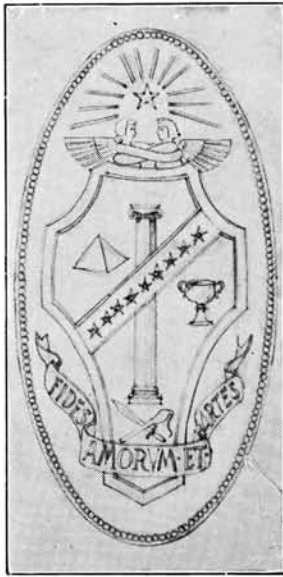

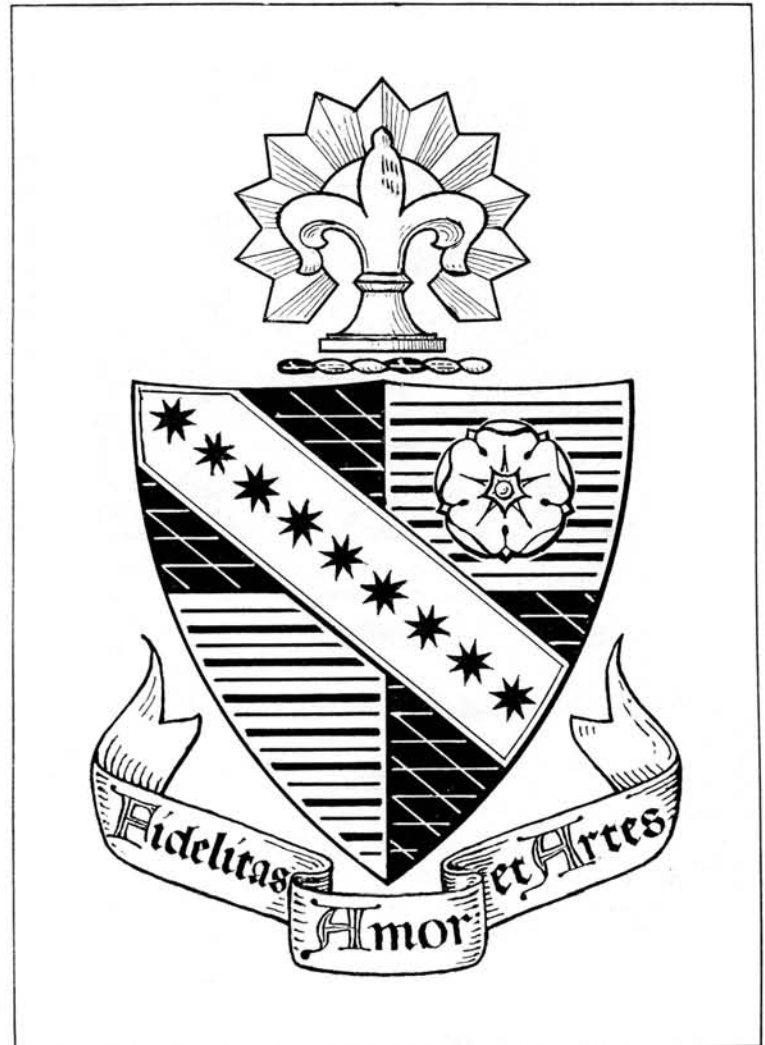
