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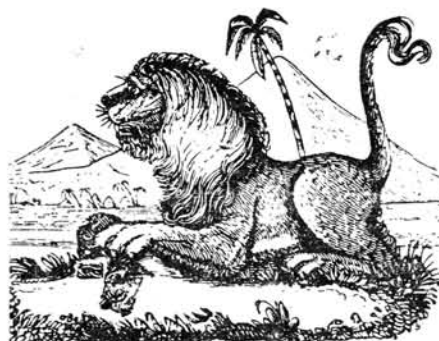
Vitruvius Prepares for 27th National Convention

STATE COLLEGE, PA. DEC. 1. — This city of 12,000 residents and 16,000 students is pleasantly excited over the approaching 27th National Convention of Alpha Rho Chi Fraternity on December 28, 29 and 30, 1960. This excitement is particularly noticeable at 246 South Pugh Street, the home of Vitruvius Chapter of this national architectural college fraternity.

State College is a mountain town, being located in the approximate center of the state and at the northern edge of the Allegheny Mountains. The three counties surrounding State College are predominantly state forest land and Mount Nittany which figures prominently in the vocabulary of Penn State University is a big, sugar-loaf mountain which overlooks the area.

THE TOWN HAS become nationally famous over the years by the story that so-called Nittany lions prowl the streets to the dismay of the residents not to mention the effect on traffic. This story cannot be substantiated at this time although there is a stone lion on campus sculptured by Heinz Warneke which is regarded with some awe by the local people. It is true, however, that deer may be seen on the main streets and the surrounding forests contain bear as well as smaller wild animals and birds.

THE UNIVERSITY was chartered in 1885 as The Farmers High School. In 1873 the name was changed to The Pennsylvania State College and co-eds were admitted. In 1953 Penn State's name was changed to The Pennsylvania State University in recognition of its standing as one of the leading Universities of the country.

The Department of Architecture is in the College of Engineering and Architecture and is now moving into beautiful space in a new four million dollar Engineering Building. The President of Penn State University is Eric A. Walker who was formerly Dean of Engineering and Architecture. He followed Milton S. Eisenhower, well known for his family connections. The Department of Architecture has 242 students and a faculty of 18. It is a five-year course with its own curriculum throughout. Milton S. Osborne, Dem. '22, is Director.

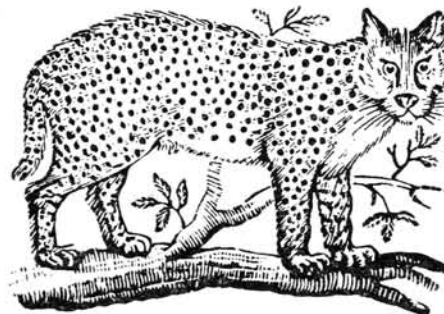
VITRUVIUS CHAPTER, although the youngest chapter of Alpha Rho Chi, is one of its most vigorous. It occupies a commodious house which was acquired by lease when the first house on Foster

Street nearby became inadequate. The chapter roll shows fifteen active members and eleven pledges. A table serves three meals a day and twenty-two are housed at the Pugh Street address. The chapter has made a name for itself in being one of the top fraternities on the campus in scholarship attainment.

A Vitruvius Alumni Association was organized early this spring with thirty-nine members. It is active in support and supervision of the active chapter.

THE CONVENTION will begin at 9 o'clock on December 28 and will continue to Friday night, December 30. Delegates from the active chapters, national officers and many non-official active and alumni members are expected.

State College can be reached by rail at Lewiston (Penna. R.R.) thirty miles distant with a Greyhound Bus connection. Air traffic is uncertain at this time of year. Driving is the recommended course and excellent highways (U.S. 220) reach the area either from Pittsburgh or Bedford on the Pennsylvania Turnpike. It looks like it will be quite a show.

The Convention Program

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN. — Nov. 28. Robert F. Calrow, W G A, said today that the subject to be followed at the 27th Convention is "Alpha Rho Chi's Four-Year Program." This program consists of four major aims — 1) More spirit; 2) More chapters; 3) More pledges; 4) More money.

Subjects for discussion will be therefore — "How can we improve our pledging practices? How can we make our chapters more of a factor in the School? What can we do to hold at least 80% of our pledges? How can we become more

national in our outlook and operations? Welding the alumni and actives into one national body. Expansion — more chapters; where and how?"

"Everyone of us associated with college campus and fraternity activities," said Calrow, "knows that the fraternity system is under unusual stress today. This is not due to lack of material since all colleges are growing. It is due to the distractions of modern life, early marriages, inadequate preparation for college study, a lackadaisical attitude by the fraternities themselves, a tendency on the part of the fraternity system to remain amateur in the face of

professional competition, a failure by the fraternity to evaluate its functions, its responsibilities, its possibilities. These are the reasons why this 27th National Convention is one of the most important Conventions our Fraternity has held in its forty-six-year history."

It is the current opinion throughout the Fraternity that Alpha Rho Chi does have something unusual to offer to the student and the School and with the aid of these upcoming discussions should be better able to improve its position and do those things which will add local and national strength.

Who Was Vitruvius?

The source of this information is *VITRUVIUS ON ARCHITECTURE* (ten books) edited and translated into English by Frank Granger, D.Lit., A.R.I.B.A., Professor in University College, Nottingham, England, published by the Harvard University Press in 1931. This is one of the Loeb Classical Library books published by Harvard, covering the great classics.

The author says in his preface that we know more about Vitruvius than we do about Shakespeare. His full name was Marcus Vitruvius Pollio. He was born about 80 B. C. and wrote his ten books about 30 B. C. He became Official Architect-Engineer of Emperor Caesar Augustus in the rebuilding of Rome about 24 B.C. He was master of the entire field of architecture including design, engineering, specifications and supervision. The only building we know he designed is the Basilica at Fano, Italy.

His "Ten Books" are a mine of information about the Roman attitude toward architecture and the professional position which the architect held. His Books concerning the education of the architect and his professional duties and responsibilities are almost as applicable today as they were nearly 2000 years ago. He states the triple essence of architecture — constructive strength, practical utility and aesthetic effect.

His Books were the first and most important treatise on architecture to the modern day. They were the standard to the 6th Century and the fall of Rome and were republished first in Latin in 1486 and were a standard throughout the Renaissance.

LETTERS FROM THE EDITOR

The Fraternity's Value

What is the value to its members of a college fraternity — or specifically of our own Fraternity? Active members of Alpha Rho Chi are both human beings and students of architecture — so, you say, in which area do you mean?

We mean in both areas! Why not? Because the specific function of our Fraternity is to contribute to the expansion of the student's abilities both as a person and as an architect.

In a recent interview published in "Horizon" Eero Saarinen (many of us knew his father) says that "the architect's role is expanding in every direction." What I believe he means is — and a reading of the interview will show this — that the architect must be a thoroughly equipped man "in every direction" — he must have an amplified education because the requirements of today's practice require greater skills than those of yesterday's more placid, less mobile time.

In the study of architecture then is it not true that a broadening of the mind is one of the ways in which Alpha Rho Chi can prepare its members for the "greater opportunities" we talk about in our ritual? I think so.

The Importance of Rushing

In the college fraternity today rushing is the most important issue. The survival of the fraternity system as a whole and particularly the survival of the smaller fraternity or the poorly organized fraternity (whoever it may be) or the fraternity which is local rather than national in its viewpoint swings primarily on whether it can maintain its membership.

Many students come to the University today with little or no knowledge of the advantage of fraternities. Many come with a generally inadequate preparation for college which is a main reason for freshman scholastic mortality. Because the fraternities have been reticent in speaking publicly about their ideals and achievements and advantages they have placed themselves on the defensive in certain scholastic areas. We have failed to make it clear that we think students are people before and after they become scholars and that the fraternity, properly administered, contributes to the humanities and to scholarship as well. We believe that students come to college for what once was referred to as an "education" and that this includes not only the acquisition of facts and skills and the training of the mentality but also human graces and disciplines which will ultimately make scholarship usable.

In other words, we need to advertise what it is we have to sell and the benefits which will accrue to the young man who buys what we have to sell. This is a day when this is true in every manifestation of human existence. We may or may not like it but that is the way things are just the same.

We are forced, therefore, to spell out to the rushee why our Fraternity exists, what it can do for him and how he can not afford to pass up the opportunity to join it when that opportunity is offered.

If a battle for survival is experienced in the fraternity system the professional fraternity should have the advantage because it is closer to academic life and has more to offer both to the student and to the school. Presenting these advantages in an intelligent, well-organized and persuasive way is — Rushing!

James T. Strong, Anth. w'44, son of Truman J. Strong, Anth. '17, is an executive officer on board the atomic-powered submarine Seadragon, which completed a history-making submerged passage from the East Coast to Alaska, via the North Pole.

Last December Strong ("Duke") participated in the commissioning ceremonies of his son's submarine and was on board her for two submerged days when it dived deeper than the 300 feet reported on her North Pole passage.

In appreciation he designed and had cast a very handsome commissioning plaque with parchment prints which were accepted with
